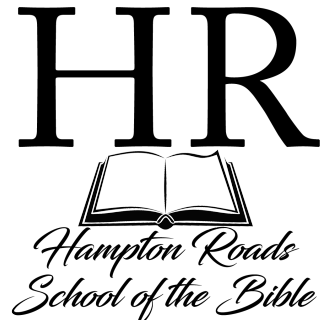


# COURSE SYLLABUS



**Course Title:** Basic Bible Doctrine I

**Instructor:** James Grandinetti

**Course Length:** 12 Weeks/ Lessons

**Course Overview:** Basic Bible Doctrine I will present clear Bible teaching in the subjects of bibliology (the study of the Bible), theology (the study of God), Christology (the study of Jesus Christ), pneumatology (the study of the Holy Spirit), and angelology (the study of angels). Bible answers are given to commonly asked questions concerning the Christian faith.

**Course Requirements:** To complete this course, students must: (1) Watch each lesson video, (2) Attempt each lesson quiz, and (3) Submit a lesson summary for each of the 12 lessons.<sup>1</sup> Manually check the completion box after watching the video for each lesson. (See Moodle instruction document under announcements.)

**Course Objectives:** For the student to have a basic understanding of Bible Doctrine. Students should be able to define Bibliology, Theology, Christology, Pneumatology, and Angelology. Students should be able to identify key passages that deal with each subject and articulate clearly what the Bible teaches on these subjects.
