

COURSE SYLLABUS



Course Title: Old Testament Survey I

Instructor: Jonathan Hooper

Course Length: 12 Weeks/ Lessons

Course Overview: Old Testament Survey I is a survey of the Books of Law (Genesis through Deuteronomy) and the Historical Books (Joshua through Esther) of the Old Testament. The main theme of each book is highlighted along with other significant features including keywords, key verses, and pictures of Christ.

Course Requirements: To complete this course, students must: (1) Watch each lesson video, (2) Attempt each lesson quiz, and (3) Submit a lesson summary for each of the 12 lessons.¹ Manually check the completion box after watching the video for each lesson. (See Moodle instruction document under announcements.)

Course Objectives: For the student to have a grasp of the Bible as a whole by looking at the key features and thrust of each book in the Old Testament. Students should be able to discuss the main thrust of each Old Testament book and highlight some of the key passages in each Old Testament book. Students should also be able to relate how each Old Testament book fits in with the Bible as a whole.

Additional and Suggested Reading²: SR - Exploring the Scriptures by John Philips (Read the chapter on each book of the Bible that is discussed.), Each Old Testament Book - Genesis - Esther. AR - The Unfolding Drama of Redemption by William Graham Scroggie, Old Testament Bible History by Richard Hester, Explore the Book by J. Sidlow Baxter

Course Outline and Schedule: Week 1 - Intro to the Old Testament, Week 2 - Genesis, Week 3 Exodus, Week 4 Leviticus/Numbers, Week 5 Deuteronomy, Week 6 Joshua/Judges, Week 7 Ruth, Week 8 I/II Samuel, Week 9 I/II Kings, Week 10 I/II Chronicles, Week 11 Ezra, Week 12 Nehemiah/Esther
